OPDs empowered on girls and women rights

MANAD participated in the human rights and gender disability meeting held at Grace **Bandawe Conference Center** in Blantyre on 11th and 12th March 2024. the workshop facilitated by Fedoma. MANAD was represented by the Women and Youth Coordinator, Ms. Margret D avid. During the meeting, the MA-NAD Women and youth coordinator shared a brief overview of deaf and deafness. In her presentation, she outlined some of the major issues that causes a person to be-

come deaf where as others

are born deaf and others deaf later in life. she also explained the major challenges deaf people face in their everyday life such as communication

The discussions further proceeded into gender and disability where issues of gender equality and equal participation of women and girls with disabilities towards all opportunities is a challenge.

Women and girls with disabilities are having their rights violated, therefore,

women and girls with disabilities have to empowered to speak up whenever they face discrimination of any kind.

The meeting also discussed the conventions of the rights of the people with disabilities whereas major issues such as attitudes, communication, accessibility and policy were discussed

cased various activities. MANAD presented the Malawian Sign Language Dictionary and other digital books that are being developed.

MANAD trains parents of deaf children and teachers in basic sign language in Mangochi



Save the Children recognizes the importance of parental involvement in a child's life and acknowledges the communication difficulties faced by parents of deaf children. To address this issue, Save the Children is conducting training sessions for 250 parents/guardians of deaf children and both special needs and mainstream teachers in basic Malawian sign language in Mangochi, Ntcheu, Neno, Dedza and Zomba.

This week, the training sessions are being held in the Mangochi district, targeting parents, guardians, and special needs teachers.

One participant, Suzen Sululu, a 32-year-old mother of a 15-year-

old deaf girl, expressed her appreciation for the initiative. She shared that understanding her daughter, who is both deaf and unable to speak, had been extremely challenging. Previously, when her daughter returned from school, she would attempt to convey what she had learned, but Suzen couldn't comprehend. However, after just two days of joining the training, their communication has significantly improved, bringing her immense joy.

Suzen also expressed her

wish for her daughter to receive support with hearing gadgets, which would further enhance her communication abilities.

Zakeyu Mwase, the coordinator of Save the Children's Strengthening Disability

Inclusive project, emphasized that the deaf awareness and sign language training will not only enhance deaf children's participation in family life and school communities but also contribute to their academic achievements. The ultimate goal is to empower deaf children to lead successful, independent lives as they grow older.º

MANAD and Save the Children partnership is growing stronger



After a successful four-day training session organized by Save the Children in partnership with MANAD in Dedza, both the parents of deaf children and teachers received sign language dictionaries from Save the Children. A total of 45 sign language dictionaries were distributed to the participants. These are part of 400 sign language dictionaries that were printed by

the Save the Children.

The initiative is following similar activities that took place in Blantyre and Phalombe under Finnish Association of the Deaf (FAD) funded project. The Save the Children ones took place in Neno, Mangochi, Zomba, Ntcheu, and Dedza – but the work is still continuing

During the training, Malonje Phiri, the Acting Programs OfMANAD thanked Save the Children's efforts through the Strengthening Disability Inclusive Project in supporting deaf community. "MANAD initiated its interventions three decades

ago, we are currently in all districts however, some interventions such like these training are not fully covered in all districts. We are yet to reach all districts in Malawi, but with financial assistance from Save the Children and FAD, we will get there."

Apart from training parents of deaf children and teachers in basic sign language, Save the Children is also funding deaf leadership capacity training in same districts. During these trainings, sign language dictionaries are being distributed to deaf people.

Despite working with Save the Children for a short period, MANAD has already expanded its work. Save the Children has proven to be an exceptional partner.

MANAD review internal assessment project

MANAD trained on fraud and corruption safeguarding



MANAD participated in a training on fraud and corruption safeguarding. This was organized by Save the Children for all its partners. The training focused on how organization can safeguard resources against misuse and how to report fraudulent activities that leads to abuse

of organization resources that may lead to loss of trust from donors amongst others.

There were 9 partner organizations that work with Save the Children International and MANAD is one of them.

MANAD was represented by the board chair, Robert Mbendera, deputy youth chair, Kettie Mwamvani and Thyolo district branch chair Martin Jeremiah.

BT police trains Deaf members in GBV

Blantyre Police Station conducted a Gender Based Violence (GBV) training session for the MA-NAD members in Blantyre district. The training was held on Saturday, 13th April

2024 at
HHI Primary School.
The event was facilitated by Sergeants
Zione Lapani and
Chifundo Namanja.

During the training, the facilitators emphasized the importance of reporting cases of GBV in the workplace, to families, or in a psychological context to



the nearest police station. They explained that immediate reporting can help ensure that human rights violations are addressed and that victims receive the necessary assistance. Sergeant Lapani encouraged all Deaf members to report any violent incidents and do so promptly at their nearest police station. Rodrick Kapatuka, a MANAD member who attended the training,

through a sign language interpreter expressed his gratitude for the efforts of the Blantyre Police Station officers. He stated, "I and my friends are thrilled with this training. We have learned a lot about Gender Based Violence and understand that if we face any violence, we should report it to the police station without hesitation."

FAD and MANAD held 2024 annual negotiation meeting


MANAD train district leaders on **PSEAH**

Community intervention in sign language is bearing fruits

Following numerous sign language trainings that were offered to parents of deaf children and teachers, MANAD, and program funder, Save the Children conducted monitoring exercises. A monitoring exercise was performed in the Ntcheu and Zomba districts. This was done to assess and evaluate the effectiveness of the training previously provided by MANAD to parents, caregivers, and teachers of Deaf children, to find out whether deaf children can articulate in their language in class and to find out whether members of the community were able to include deaf child in community activities like playing with peers.

The results were encouraging. Many parents were able to accommodate and interact with their Deaf children. However, the challenge was that the four-day training that they received

MANAD Advocacy committee in 2024 IDSL preps

mittee focused on the challenges and successes of the previous IDW and ISLD commemoration and the way forward, efforts will be made to ensure the 2024 commemoration is a success.

MANAD conduct ICT literacy training

MANAD conducted a two days training in ICT literacy in Liwonde from 24- 25 May, 2024. This training provided an opportunity for the Deaf members to acquire more knowledge on how they can use internet and technology for communication. Training was facilitated by MANAD ICT specialist Lloyd Chilongo who is a deaf degree graduate in IT from the Malawi University of Business and Applied Sciences (MUBAS).

One of the beneficiary of the training, Kettie Mwamvani said that learning IT shaped them and help them effectively contribute to the human development in the Deaf society. "this is a productive tool that would transform the wellbeing of Deaf people" she said.

Although training was short we managed to cover most essential topic that have laid foundation for more advanced knowledge in ICT.

The participants were from 13 Districts namely: Blantyre, Mulanje, Thyolo, Dedza, Mangochi, Neno Lilongwe, Kasungu Mchinji, Nkhotakota Rumphi, Mzuzu and Chitipa. This is the first cohort of learners. Next year, other deaf people will be trained in same programme.







A company recruited Deaf youths

For many years MA-NAD has been conducting deaf awareness meetings in various forums including public and private companies. One of the issues raised is the prohibition of discrimination against people based on hearing status. The Malawi constitution and Persons with Disabilities Act, 2024, guarantee

equal and effective protection against discrimination on grounds of disability. However, discrimination against deaf people still prevails.

MANAD youths approached K-2 Transformers Company, based in Lilongwe. This is a manufacturing company K -2 Transformers Company is expert in making transformers, repairing transformers, beer, and food. Is based in Lilongwe District. Lilongwe branch's chairperson Blessings Kaimilira, who also happens to be MANAD national youth chair had an

interactive session with K-2 company, where he asked the company to consider employing energetic and effective deaf people. The company was satisfied with the presentation made by the MANAD youth chair and managed to recruit five deaf youths.

Upon hearing the news that five deaf youths were recruited, Kaimilira was in a jovial mood. "I wish to commend the company for the steps it is taking towards correcting these gaps. We need to closely work together to address challenges are facing in the country," Kaimilira said.



Bwaila hospital health workers trains deaf members on preventive health

Lilongwe Branch deaf members together with the hearing sign language students received training on preventive health. The training was facilitated by Bwaila Hospital health workers. Members were trained in cancer treatment, HIV/ AIDS prevention and care.

On HIV infections members learned about transmission, prevention, and management, emphasizing the importance of regular testing, adherence to medication regimens, and safe practices.

On cancer, Deaf members learned about the risk of cancer, early detection methods, and the importance of regular screening and healthy lifestyle choices to reduce risk.

The overall goal is to empower deaf people with the knowledge to better manage any health condition they may have.



GOVTs commitment to inclusive education

Secretary for Education, Associate Prof.
Mangani Katundu has opened the Education Technology for Special Education Needs and Disabilities (SEND) workshop on 19th March, 2024, at the Sigelege Hotel, in Lilongwe, facilitated by the Edtech Hub.

He highlighted Government's commitment to inclusive development (Malawi 2063), encapsulated in the goal of equitable access to quality education and improved governance in the NESIP (2020-2030). Dr. Mangani also sampled key initiatives that are revolutionizing inclusive education, such as the sign language Dictionary by MANAD, the lip-synced digital teacher in One-Tab under the BEFIT national scale, Ekitab's SEND digital content, and technologies under development by innovators and academia in collaboration with DSTI and Inclusive Education.

He called upon Notting-

ham University, UK, and local ones, Montfort College, USAID, FCDO, Save the Children, Imagine Worldwide, JBJ foundation, OneBillion, Fount for Nations and parents to innovate more and for all.

Ministry of Gender, Association for People with Albinism in Malawi and Civil Society Education Coalition (CSEC) are also in participation.

MANAD leaders equipped in leadership skills

The MANAD Secretariat and board chairperson visited 6 districts meeting its MANAD members and leaders. the districts that were visited were Dowa, Kasungu, Mzimba, Rumphi, Karonga, and Chitipa. The purpose of the visits was to train members in human rights and organiza-

tional management and leadership. In Dowa, Mzimba, Rumphi, Ka-

ronga, and Chitipa, they also held district branch committee elections where



new officebearers were elected. Apart from leadership training, they also disseminated and distributed MSL dictionaries.

MANAD opens new sign language training centres



Due to high demand for sign language training among hearing people, MANAD decided to open additional sign language training centres.

Many have wondered where they can acquire basic Malawi sign language in Malawi. The early training centres were Blantyre, Lilongwe, Mzuzu, Zomba, Phalombe and Salima. The

following have been opened in January, 2024. these are; Thyolo, Mangochi, Mchinji, Nkhotakota, Dedza and Rumphi.

However Blantyre and Lilongwe have two centres each. This is due to the size and population of these cities.

MANAD is only an organization in Malawi with qualified sign language teachers trained by the Finnish Association of the Deaf (FAD) and Deaf Action of Scotland.

According to Andrew Chinthunzi a sign language teacher based in Lilongwe, the also offer sign language classes to parents of the Deaf and hard of hearing children. This initiative increases family and social bonding between deaf child and members of the family.

Ntchisi Deaf Women in village bank and savings drive

Following the formation of the women's group in Ntchisi district, women's village bank. In Malawi, a village bank is a (sometimes informal) self-help support group of 20-30 members, predominantly female heads -of-household or as a joint account per household. The main purpose of setting up these banks is to develop the habit of saving among the Deaf women members and to give loans to themselves to boost their personal business and production in one or the other way.



However, sometimes, they meet and discuss issues about their sexual reproductive health, and gender-based violence among others.
